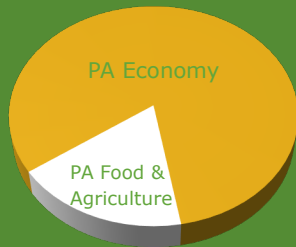


STATS & PROJECTIONS: PA Food and Agriculture

STRAIGHT TO WORKFORCE

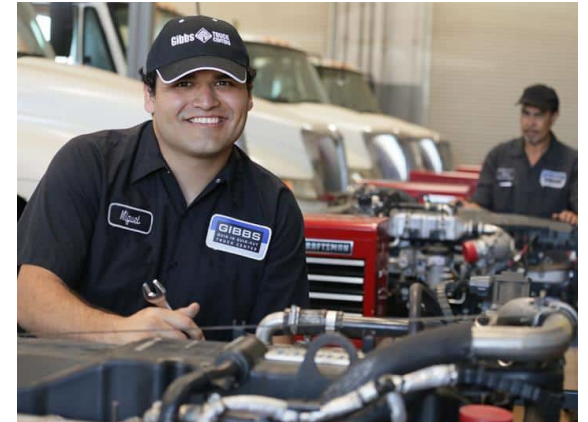
